
SERVICE OF THE LONGEST NIGHT DECEMBER 21, 7PM

SONG Welcome to the World

LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT CANDLES

One: We light this candle to remember those who have died, those whose names we speak in our hearts.
We remember them, their names, their faces, their voices.
We give thanks to you, O God, for our memories of them.
All: May God's eternal love surround them.

One: We light this second candle to acknowledge the pain of loss: the loss of relationships, the loss of jobs, the loss of health.As we gather up the pain of the past, we offer it to you, O God, asking that into our hearts you will place the gift of peace.All: Refresh, restore, renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

One: We light this third candle to remember ourselves before God this Christmas time. We pause and remember the past weeks, months and for some of us, years of difficult times. We hold before you our memories, the grief, the sadness and hurts. And we hold before you those whom we know who need your love. All: We remember that the light of the world was born at Christmas, and has not been overcome by the darkness.

TIME OF HEALING PRAYER

During this time you may visit the prayer stations or pray quietly in your seat.

Anointing

Come forward to a pastor for anointing with oil and for personal prayer. You may ask for prayer for yourself or another person and can be as specific or private as you need. Please indicate whether you'd like anointing on your hand or forehead.

Candles

Pray for hope, peace, joy or love for yourself or a loved one by lighting a candle on the communion table.

Manger

The manger held a vulnerable infant, God incarnate; it can hold any prayer you have. Write your prayers on the slips of paper and place them in the manger.

Bowl

By the silhouetted nativity is a bowl full of salty water, representing God's tears. Add salt to the bowl to signify your own sadness and suffering. Dip your finger in the water and nake the sign of the cross on your forehead or hand, signifying that through the waters of baptism, God can transform anything into new life.

LITANY OF AFFIRMATION

One: God did not wait 'til the world was ready, 'til nations were at peace. All: God came when the heavens were unsteady and prisoners cried out for release. One: God did not wait for the perfect time. All: God came when the need was deep and great. God dined with sinners in all their grime. One: God did not wait 'til hearts were pure. All: In joy, God came to a tarnished world of sin and doubt. To a world like ours, of anguished shame, God came and God's light would not go out. One: God came to a world which did not mesh; to heal its tangles, shield its scorn. All: In the mystery of Word made flesh, the maker of the stars was born. One: We cannot wait 'til the world is sane to raise our songs with joyful voice, or to share our grief, to touch our pain. All: God came with love: Rejoice! Rejoice!

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CHILDREN AND FAMILIES:

We LOVE kids at Westfield. Children are welcome to stay through the whole service. If your child is more active, relax! We believe God put the wiggles and giggles in children. Don't feel you have to suppress it in God's house. All are welcome!

Sit toward the front where it is easier for your little ones to see and hear what's going on at the altar. They tire of seeing the backs of others' heads.

Quietly explain the parts of worship. Sing the hymns, pray, and voice the responses. Children learn liturgical behavior by copying you.

If you have to leave the service with your child, feel free to do so, but please come back. As Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me."

Remember that the way we welcome children in church directly affects the way they respond to the Church, to God, and to one another. Let them know that they are at home in this house of worship.

THE REV. DR. JONATHAN CHAPMAN



The Rev. Dr. Jonathan Chapman graduated from Candler School of Theology, Emory University, in May 2019 with his Doctor of Ministry in Biblical Witness and Proclamation. His capstone work, The Year of Mark, received the People's Choice Award among his cohort. While at Candler for his Master of Divinity (May, 2010), he was active with the Office of Worship, and was awarded the Hoyt Hickman Award for Outstanding Liturgical Scholarship. Jonathan is a 2007 Congregational Fellow and 2006 Undergraduate Fellow with The Fund for Theological Education. He graduated from Elon University in 2007 with a degree in Religious Studies. At Elon, he was selected as a Leadership Fellow and was awarded the W. L. Monroe Christian Education and Personality Award in the 2007. While at Elon he joined Elon Community Church, United Church of Christ, the congregation in which he was ordained.

Jonathan joined Westfield in October of 2012 and was officially installed as Pastor and Teacher in May of 2013, presiding over its revitalization. In October of 2022, he celebrated a decade with Westfield.

He was selected to be a part of the Next Generation Leadership Initiative, a program sponsored by the Pension Boards of the United Church of Christ that works with young clergy committed to parish ministry through a decade-long relationship. Dr. Chapman consults with congregations on a variety of topics ranging from revitalization to worship to marketing their churches. He married his husband, Greg (pastor of Enfield Congregational Church, United Church of Christ in Enfield, CT), in December of 2014 at Westfield. Jonathan is an award-winning stained glass artist.

Rev. Jonathan's Onsite Hours are Monday-Thursday, 9am-12pm. His additional work day is Sunday, when he is available by appointment. His days off are Friday and Saturday.
